Years filled with drug use, gang life, and interims in and out of juvenile detention centers and later prisons followed. He finally reached his end: he sought to purchase enough drugs to end his life. It was at this point that he came to Pacific Garden Mission, where he heard the Gospel message and gave his heart to Jesus Christ. Thomas admits, "I was on a road to death or jail; now I give my testimony, and people come to me and say my story really helped them."

Carl Montgomery was on the road to destruction. As a gang member, he was shot and stabbed several times. The last time he was shot, he went to Iowa to recover safely. A year and half later, he was setting up a dope house in Iowa using his Chicago connections. While in Chicago to pick up drugs, he decided to use a "little" of the dope himself; four days later, he was out of dope and money. An acquaintance directed him to PGM where he received food and rest. For the next few days, he would wake to stories of Jesus. He saw others full of joy and thought maybe they were on some type of drug. Carl surrendered to Jesus; the Lord revealed to Carl that "there is no right way to do wrong." Carl said that "without Him, life wasn't worth living; now I love learning to do right as defined by the King."

was in a situation where people were trying to hurt me, seriously. I jumped on a number 14 bus and wound up getting off at Balbo and Michigan. I had never been on that bus [14 bus route] before. Something led me towards State Street. And I saw that cross, and inside I met Byron Freeman, and I broke down crying. If I had not found that cross, I would be dead. My motto back then was, 'If you want to do evil, follow me.' Now, I understand grace and mercy. I just want to grow stronger in God."

Kenyetta Edwards says that her life took a bad turn around the age of thirteen when she ran away from home. As she grew older, she began getting into fights and having a difficult time holding her temper. In her twenties, she started drinking. Having suicidal thoughts, suffering from depression, and still fighting anger issues, Kenyetta arrived at PGM, where she was given Godly counsel and a place on the Women's Bible Program. She is now brushing up on her education with classes offered here in the mission. Looking upon her time here at PGM, Kenyetta says, "Jesus helped me. I am getting an understanding of God, and Jesus has helped me with my problems, and my emotions."

At eleven, Walter Thomas began running with the gangs of Chicago. At age twenty he began serving his first murder conviction. Nearly eleven years later, he was released; however, within three months, he was convicted of a double murder. He was unexpectedly released in 2011. Decades earlier, a woman passing out Gospel tracts had told him that he needed to get into a Bible program like PGM. Now faced with an unex-



pected chance to live outside of prison, he wanted to find out if this God was real. Two days after being released from prison, he came to PGM and heard about grace. Walter knew about the law, that it condemned him to hell, but grace he'd not heard of before. He joined the program and soaked up all the truth he could. Now his greatest joy is to share Christ with troubled young people. For Walter, PGM brought him from the dark into the shining light of the Lord's grace

and love; without PGM Walter said he would either be in prison for some gang-related act or dead.

Each of these stories provides a powerful example of how God's gift to man, when accepted, changes even the most desperate of lives. It is so exciting to see people being "born again," and we are eager to continue the work in 2014 with your prayers and support. A Word from Philip Kwiatkowski

President, Pacific Garden Mission

Why did Jesus come? He came to set us free.

How do *these* men do it? This is a common question that we are asked. Addiction is a plague that has infected our society. The rate of recidivism in many secular programs is very high and leaves participants feeling frustrated and hopeless.

The problem with secular treatment is that it has a faulty foundation. Romans 1:21 reads, "Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened." As society continues to move away from God, the imaginations they have for solutions to human problems will be vain.

Drug addiction has a demonic source. Revelation 9:21 reads, "Neither repented they of their murders, nor of their sorceries, nor of their fornication, nor of their thefts." The Greek word for sorceries is *pharmakeia*, from which comes our English equivalent *pharmacy* that we identify with drugs. If the source of addiction is spiritual, the world will never find a secular solution. Romans chapter six offers a key to victory.

The first key word is knowing. Romans 6:6 states, "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." Before the Bible tells us how to act, it tells us that there is something that we need to know. Society tells a person "once an addict, always an addict" or that this person has a disease that he/she was born with called an addiction. If that is what a person believes, that is what he/ she will do. The Bible says in 2 Corinthians 5:17, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new." I have to by faith believe that I can become a new creature: it is a battle of the mind. Second

Corinthians 10:4, 5 says, "(For

the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;) Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ." A stronghold is a false way of thinking. We encourage our residents to memorize Scripture, read Godly books, and renew the mind.

The second key is *to reckon*. Romans 6:11 reads, "Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord." Not only do I have to know God's truth, but I also have to reckon it to be so. I have to believe the truth of God's Word.

The third key is to yield. Romans 6:16 reads, "Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey...?" The Bible instructs us to put on the new man. Get active once you believe. Go to church, volunteer, serve God in some capacity.

This is what we teach our residents, and we have seen God doing amazing things. You have to approach the problem from the prospective of the Creator; men and women can be free indeed. John 8:32 tell us, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."
