Bruce Coleman shared his story. "I grew up in a Christian home under my mother; I didn't have a father. I got married at eighteen, but I got caught up in drinking and drugs; in fact, by the time I reached the age of twenty-three, I was doing cocaine and heroin. For thirty years I have wrestled with

chemical dependency. You know, I had been to churches off and on all my life, but until

I came here [PGM], I had never really heard the real Gospel, that Jesus died for my sins and was resurrected, that I needed to be born again and receive Him into my heart. When I came here, I was asked, 'Are you saved?' And I said, 'Hey, I'm a good guy; I try to do good things.' The man broke down the whole Gospel message, and I received Jesus into my heart and knew then I was going to heaven. I feel so blessed, and I have been drug and alcohol free for over a year now. I will graduate the Bible program this January. I'm a chef and am working part-time at a manor home while also cooking here at the mission." Bruce shared his favorite Bible verse—Galatians 2:20.

I spoke with **April Smith**, a graduate of the Women's Bible Program. She said to me, "I had a perfectly wonderful yet boring life prior to coming to PGM. I was a suburban housewife. I had belonged to works-churches, where I always felt I needed to do more, always be more, to earn my way into heaven. But Jesus' last words on the cross were, 'It is finished.' God turned my life upside down so that by His grace I ended up here [PGM]." April shared why she came to PGM: "I trusted someone I should not have trusted; the situation became volatile, and I left every-

thing—my job, my house—to protect myself and my family. I had to escape a very dangerous situation. Pacific Garden Mission became a sanctuary for me, a safe haven, a place where I have received the true Gospel of Jesus Christ. Through the teachings I have received here, it was like a veil was taken away, and I saw that I was not going to heaven. Now I know what

salvation really is. I am so blessed." April plans to return to college and focus on Biblical studies. She enjoys teaching Bible classes here for the ladies. A special Scripture verse of hers is Jeremiah 29:11.

Twenty-nine year old

David Mead shared with
me his life, his testimony.
"I was saved at the age of
six. My parents were both
missionaries. When I was
eight, though, my parents
divorced: I went to live with
my father, my younger sister
with my mother. My father,
well, he was verbally and
physically abusive. At the
age of eighteen, I was tired
of the abuse, even though I

tried to be obedient to God, going to church four times a week. I left home and was tired of God. I started doing drugs—ultimately, cocaine and then crystal meth. I married and went to church, sometimes high on drugs. Eventually, I was selling drugs, even though I now had a child, a daughter. Six

months ago, my wife left me. At that point, I no longer cared; I became self destructive. On a Friday afternoon at work, I just lifted my head up to God and asked Him to help me. I called my aunt that day. She talked to my grandparents, who had been praying for me through all my rebellion, and then told me about Pacific Garden Mission. From Utah, I came to PGM. I left everything, my home, my job, everything because I knew I needed help. I took a plane to Chicago, walked through the doors of PGM, and joined the Men's Bible program. Now, sometimes I feel I am in a dream, because I am so at peace; I feel so blessed. I am growing in the Lord, I am in the Lord, and I am in the prayer team we just started. It is an awesome peace to be in the will of God." David's favorite Bible verse, at this point in his life, is Philippians 4:13.

Fifty-four year old **Anthony Johnson** spoke with me. "My life was bound by drugs and


alcohol. I took my first drink when I was ten years old. At thirteen in 1973, I smoked my first marijuana. From that day forward I continued. At nineteen years old, I was doing cocaine. In 1982, going on twenty-two [age], heroin was what my mind and body took hold to. I was on the streets by the age of fifteen. I was told it [drug use] was just about my thinking, but then I came to Pacific Garden Mission and was told it was deeper. PGM helped me to understand exactly what has been going on in my life. I realized I needed a relationship with Jesus, that He could really help me. Now, here, on the Bible program, I

have worked to get my GED. I took the test and passed three out of the four tests; I missed passing the one by only one point. I will retake that test and get my GED." Anthony says that a special Bible verse that has been on his mind is Proverbs 22:10.

# Staying True to Our Calling

ANY CHURCHES, ORGANIZATIONS, and ministries lose their way when they forget what their main purpose is. There always seems to be a delicate balancing act between the spiritual calling and the social needs at hand. Many organizations in Chicago that at one time did a great work for God are no longer in existence because they forgot the true purpose of their existence. Jesus Himself did a lot of social good—He fed the hungry and healed the sick—but his main purpose is found in Matthew 18:11, "For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost." Recently,

the leaders and board of Pacific Garden Mission reaffirmed our purpose which reads as follows: "To reach the lost with the Gospel of Christ."

This is the reason why we exist. The following illustration is a perfect story of what happens when organizations forget. "On a dangerous seacoast where shipwrecks often occur, there was once a little life-saving station. The building was primitive, and there was just one boat, but the members of the life-saving station were committed and kept a constant watch over the sea. When a ship went down, they unselfishly went out day or night to save the lost. Because so many lives were saved by that station, it became famous. Consequently, many people wanted to be associated with the station to give their time, talent, and money to support its important work. New boats were bought, new crews were recruited, a formal training session was offered. As the membership in the life-saving station grew, some of the members became unhappy that the building was so primitive and that the equipment was so outdated. They wanted a better place to welcome the survivors pulled from the sea. So they replaced the emergency cots

with beds and put better furniture in the enlarged and newly decorated building.


"Now the life-saving station became a popular gathering place for its members. They met regularly, and when they did, it was apparent how they loved one another. They greeted each other, hugged each other, and shared with one another the events that had been going on in their lives. But fewer members were now interested in going to sea on life-saving missions; so they hired lifeboat crews to do this for them. About this time, a large ship was wrecked off of the coast, and the hired crews brought into the life-saving station boatloads of cold, wet, dirty, sick, and half-drowned people. Some of them had black skin, and some had yellow skin. Some could speak English well, and some could hardly speak it at all. Some were first-class cabin passengers of the ship, and some were the deck hands. The beautiful meeting place became a place of chaos. The plush carpets got dirty. Some of the exquisite furniture got scratched. So the property committee immediately had a shower built outside the house where the victims of shipwreck could be cleaned up before coming inside.

"At the next meeting there was rift in the membership. Most of the members wanted to stop the club's life-saving activities, for they were unpleasant and a hindrance to the normal fellowship of the members. Other members insisted that life-saving was their primary purpose and pointed out that they were still called a life-saving station. But they were finally voted down and told that if they wanted to save the lives of all those various kinds of people who would be shipwrecked, they could begin their own life-saving station down the coast. And do you know what? That is what they did.

"As the years passed, the new station experienced the same changes that had occurred in the old. It evolved into a place to meet regularly for fellowship, for committee meetings, and for special training sessions about their

mission, but few went out to the drowning people. The drowning people were no longer welcomed in that new life-saving station. So another life-saving station was founded further down the coast. History continued to repeat itself. And if you visit that seacoast today, you will find a number of adequate meeting places with ample parking and plush carpeting. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown."
