

HE HOLIDAYS DRAW UPON
US. I so much would like to
write something wonderful about
Thanksgiving, about turkey dinners and
stuffing and mashed potatoes being served
at the Old Lighthouse. However, I feel
the need to share with you something of a
different nature, of a need that is affecting
so many these days. A lady on our New
Day program remarked, "I am thankful
the mission is seeing the value of healthcare for those of us joining the

New Day program." Many of those who have abused their bodies, lived reckless lives, through drugs and/or alcohol, need not only spiritual and emotional help but help for their physical bodies. We have a spiritual remedy for people; now, though, we are better understanding and better addressing the need to meet the physical needs of those passing through our doors.

There is one heinous drug affecting America—namely, heroin. The number of deaths from heroin has risen dramatically. This is a drug that crosses all ethnic and economic backgrounds. "Heroin use no longer predominates solely in urban areas. Several suburban and rural communities near Chicago and St. Louis report increasing amounts of heroin seized by officials

as well as increasing numbers of overdose deaths due to heroin use. Heroin use is also on the rise in many urban areas among young adults aged 18-25. Individuals in this age group seeking treatment for heroin abuse increased from 11 percent of total admissions in 2008 to 26 percent in the first half of 2012" (National Institute on Drug Abuse, 2012). And what now in 2015? A phrase has recently been coined called "Heroin Highway" as people venture from the suburbs to the city to buy and use heroin. Seems there was a time when needles were needed, but now the potency is so strong that one can, as it is termed, just snort it. So, yes, sadly even teens are now becoming users.

As I shared earlier, I so wanted simply to write an uplifting message of Thanksgiving, of how your giving is providing an uplifting turkey meal with all the trimmings—and indeed your giving does this so very much. Oh my goodness, thank you so very, very much for this! Yet, I also want to share the realities of what we here at the Old Lighthouse are facing, meeting, and ministering to each and every day, whether it be an April frost or a blistering August day.

Our medical clinic has undergone a shift these past months to more fully address those with physical addiction. I sat down and spoke with Beth Bilsley, a new staff member, herself a nurse practitioner of thirty-five years, who said, "I am glad we have this on-site medical service here at PGM. Often, even though someone has insurance, that person, because of his/her addiction, may not always be treated respectfully and believed or, sadly, may manipulate the medical system to gain opiate-based pain medications. So I am able to help residents schedule appointments and

even accompany those here to their appointments and help in that person's treatment plan. I primarily,



though, treat those in our New Day and New Life programs. Our goal is to get everyone in the programs a physical and routine lab work to see where each person is. People are getting their immediate needs taken care of."

I want to share with you three testimonies, three whose heroin highway nearly led to death but now are on a highway to Heaven.

John Rigoni, a New Life resident, spoke with me about his highway to heroin journey. "I was twelve when I first tried marijuana, but it was not till I was thirty that I began using heroin. I sold drugs to make money. It was, though, when my mother and father both passed away within a short time period, I stopped doing everything except doing drugs. I turned to heroin, and everything just turned inwards. I went through all my savings of fifteen years in about two years. I began having blackouts. I remember waking up one morning and having no idea where I was or what day it was; that was a turning point in my life. I have overdosed twice. You know, if I could not have snorted heroin. I would not have done it—needles were a barrier for me from trying heroin. I came to PGM from a hospital where I had checked myself in. The New Life program has





been excellent—Pastor Bower, Pastor McNeill, Pastor Percy, Pastor Green have all helped me to understand what the Bible says. I am growing spiritually and also learning to deal with my anger and lack of patience, but I am trusting in God."

New Life graduate Daniel Woolman shared how his life was nearly

ruined by heroin. "I was twelve when I drank for the first time, fifteen when I smoked marijuana, and from sixteen to eighteen I experimented with so many different drugs. At eighteen, I first snorted heroin and within two weeks was shooting up with a needle. Within a month, I had lost all my savings and started stealing. I traveled to the city twice a day to

get heroin. I sought heroin more than food-I would rather use and know I was going to die than not use and live. I became a slave to it. I would get clean and then relapse, a cycle that kept going on and on. I realized I could not beat this thing, so I tried to kill myself by shooting up a large amount of heroin. But, I just woke up the next day. It was then that I realized I really needed a change. I went to a thirty day program and then came straight to PGM. I had went through twelve years of addiction. I thank God because I have been clean now for nearly a year and a half. My mind is

sharper, my memory improving. I realized that I had to release my addiction to Jesus, to surrender myself." Daniel does the camera work

and computer editing for PGM's Saturday television show.

Dustin Blackwell, a young man of twentyone on our New Life program, said, "I was twelve when I began smoking weed, at thirteen I ended up smoking meth, and fifteen when I tried heroin. I had tried many different drugs, but heroin hit me as something unlike any of the others. Eventually, I was spending most of my money on heroin. I went from snorting to using needles by the age of seventeen. I overdosed at one point and was afraid of going to hell. I am so glad that now I have come to know the Lord. I tried rehab more than once, but not knowing God, getting sober just left me empty. Now, the Holy Spirit has filled my soul and replaced the addiction, and I have grown up while here on the program. I hope one day I can do some type of street ministry because I have lived on the streets. In the meantime, I hope to go to medical school."

I am, though, really only left with those simple English words—*Thank you*, thank you so very much for what you have done in my life and so very, very many thousands of others here at PGM. *Thank you*. Thanksgiving holiday is upon us, and I am so thankful to the God I now serve and you who reached out to me in my time of great pain and need. *Thank you*.



I love to share amazing stories that we come across. In 1 Corinthians 1:4, we read, "Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God."

One of the reasons that a believer may go through trials or tribulation is to help someone else in a similar situation.

Three years ago, the son of a pastor arrived through our doors as a broken man. Raised by godly parents, this man made a series of bad decisions that led to what he calls rock bottom. His first breakfast was a reality check: as he stared at his grits with an egg, looking around at all the other homeless men, he thought, "It's over." He at one time ran a company, had a family, and had a nice suburban home...now he has only the clothes on his back. He walked out the door and down the street where there is a bridge over the Chicago River and wanted to jump. He stood there and thought long and hard about jumping but thankfully thought better and returned to the mission. He decided to surrender his life to Jesus Christ and join the Bible program, and his life changed. He has reconciled with his family and upon graduation found meaningful employment.

He told me recently he was walking past the same spot on the bridge, and a stranger asked him if he could use his cell phone. As he inquired further, the stranger said that he wanted to jump off the bridge and into the river. He was amazed. He told the stranger, "You won't believe this, but three years ago I stood at the same spot and wanted to do the same thing." The stranger declared that he was not a Christian, so the man proceeded to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with him. The stranger heard about hope in our Lord—how he can be forgiven—and was given an invitation to come to Pacific Garden Mission. 911 was called, and the stranger was taken to a hospital, but not before a solution was offered, the solution of hope in Jesus Christ. We never know when God will use some of the pain of our past to comfort someone else with the comfort we received by God. Look around yourself; maybe God has placed someone in your path who needs to hear a message of hope and salvation because at one point you needed that hope too.


